- Burke Page 273
- "... one last, major success ... When he read *Origin*, Marx wrote to Engels, '*Origin* is the history foundation for our views.' Dialectal Materialism ... paralleled Darwin's mechanism of evolution. Society, like nature, improved over time."

Burke on the World after Darwin Page 273

"... Darwin removed the supernatural, teleological meaning of existence, just as Marx did. Man was able to modify history once he had understood that history obeyed laws just as nature did. Progress was only possible through belief in these views. Change was at the root of human development.

Thanks to Darwin the modern view of the human condition today is essentially the same, on both sides of the ideological border. The disagreements are not about whether society can progress, but about the methods to be used. Both sides are equally materialist. On both sides man is alone with the problem of his future. Life is, in the literal sense, what we make it."

- •The Answer to the Problem -The Study of Administration Page 673
- "Most important to be observed is the truth already so much and so fortunately insisted upon by our civil service reformers; namely, that administration lies outside the proper sphere of politics. Administrative questions are not political questions. Although politics sets the task for administration, it should not be suffered to manipulate its offices."

- •CPFB Consumer Protection Finance Board
- Independently funded
- Independence of it's chairman being challenged in courts


Problems with Expertise

- Don't worry you're guilty.







No Separation of Powers

Administrative Agencies
Set rules
Enforce rules
Decide which cases to bring
Note - Article III courts can't initiate cases in other types of law - executive branch prosecutors bring cases
Adjudicate the cases
Hear appeals
See The Problem of the Administrative State, in One Paragraph



The Chevron Doctrine

- •If you lose all your "appeals" inside an administrative agency, you can then go to the "regular" or "Article III" Courts.
- •Then you run into the "Chevron Doctrine."
- the 1984 Chevron v. NRDC decision
- The court assumes the agency knows more than the court does and defers to the agency so, why did you bother to appeal?
- See <u>Judge Gorsuch and the Chevron Two-Step</u>

- •...
- •The prospect of domination of the nation's scholars by Federal employment, project allocations, and the power of money is ever present and is gravely to be regarded.
- Yet, in holding scientific research and discovery in respect, as we should, we must also be alert to the equal and opposite danger that public policy could itself become the captive of a scientific-technological elite.
- It is the task of statesmanship to mold, to balance, and to integrate these and other forces, new and old, within the principles of our democratic system ever aiming toward supreme goals of our free society."

Congressional Oversight

- Theory and Practice
 - Why not avoid it
 - Congress can look good by passing a bill that says "Make the world perfect"
 - They can blame others if it doesn't work.
 - It's not my fault
 - The special interests did it
 - It's the fault of "Citizens United and all the money in politics"
 - Isn't it a shame that the system is busted
- Respect for Congress is in the dumps

Attempt to Restore Oversight

- •The Congressional Review Act (CRA)
- Passed in 1996 as part of the Contract with America
- Gives Congress 60 working days to overturn a regulation by a majority of both houses with the agreement of the President. They can, with a larger majority, override his veto.
- Obama successfully vetoed 5 attempts to use it in his term
- Being used successfully now.

The Problem with CRA

- •The Agency action takes effect unless Congress and the President override it.
- •The President can effectively bypass Congress unless a vetoproof majority overrides him.
- •The legislative (Article I) function stills resides in the executive (Article II) branch.

What is the REINS Act?


•Regulations from the Executive In Need of Scrutiny (REINS) The bill would require congressional approval for regulations that are deemed a "major rule" by the Office of Management and Budget. A "major rule" is a regulation that has costs \$100 million or more, increases costs for consumers, and hurts U.S.-based companies in competition with foreign ones. A joint session in Congress would have 70 days to approve any proposed regulation by executive agencies

Bill passed the house in January and Trump said he will sign it if it gets to his desk.
